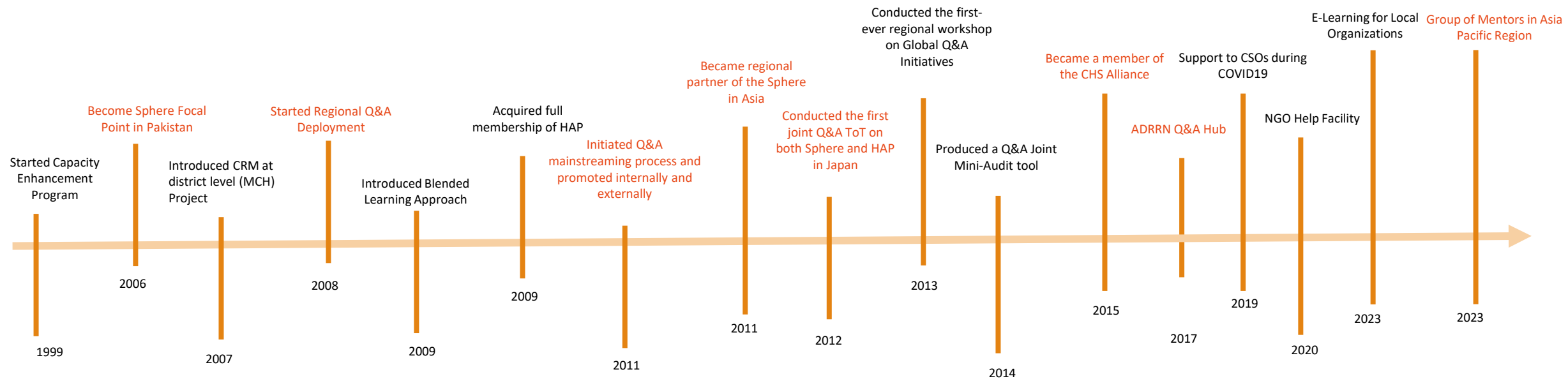

## Sphere Is Not Static — It's Local, Adaptive, and Growing

In Japan, Sphere contextualization is now based on case studies from domestic disasters, supported by university partners and government actors.

Indonesia has built disability-inclusive trainings and used Sphere in DRR, PSEAH, and military engagement dialogues.

Nepal, Bangladesh, and Pakistan have embedded Sphere into youth engagement, community events, and training of trainers.

The value lies in seeing how others adapt Sphere to work in local cultures and systems.

# What Makes These Meetings Valuable?

ASPECT	VALUE FOR ASIAN FOCAL POINTS
Learning	Immediate access to tested training formats, translation strategies, and outreach models.
Connection	A safe, horizontal space to speak freely about challenges (e.g., political constraints, burnout).
Inspiration	Real stories of change — from local DRR youth groups in Nepal to Sphere trainings in Iran humanitarian corridors.
Momentum	Keeps national and regional efforts aligned with global Sphere vision and CHS evolution.
Visibility	FPs gain confidence to share their achievements, sometimes influencing global resource development.

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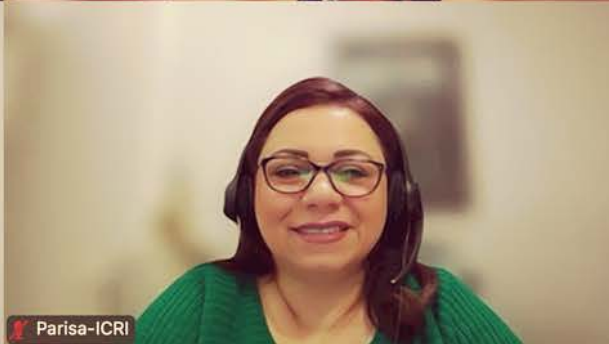
